GET THE MOST FROM YOUR READING EXPERIENCES

Before you read:

- Choose a book that you think you will enjoy. Read the synopsis and a page or two. Recommendations from friends are also helpful or you can do a little research to find out more about the author.
- Reach out to the Plainfield Public Library (http://www.plainfieldlibrary.info/ or call 908-757-1111) to access e-books and other resources.

While you read:

- Read at your own pace. Ideally, you should read for at least 20 minutes every day, but check-in with yourself to be sure you are truly understanding what you are reading and that you are not just skimming the page. No need to rush!
- Read Aloud. Think about sharing your reading with your family and friends. If possible, set up a time everyday to read aloud a section of the book. This is a great way to share your reading expertise and interests with younger siblings.
- Write down any unfamiliar words or phrases and look up their meanings. This will help to build your vocabulary and improve your understanding of the story.
- Keep some paper, a notebook or post-its handy while you read. As you get to important parts of the book or major changes or challenges for your character, make note of the page and what is important to the story. You can also make a prediction about what will happen as a result of this event or change.

After you read:

- Think about what you have read. Did you learn something? Has the way you think about an issue or topic changed? Can you make a connection between this book and another book you read, a personal experience, or something else you know about?
- Tell your family and friends about what you read. Share your opinions, reactions, and connections. Make recommendations to others that you think would enjoy the book.






RECOMMENDED READING LIST



Acevedo, Elizabeth. *Clap When You Land*. Quill Tree Books, 2020. Two sister – Camino in the Dominican Republic and Yahaira in New York – learn of each other when their father dies in a plane crash. (National Book Award)

Baldwin, James. *The Fire Next Time.* 1963. An examination of the consequences of racial injustice, this book consists of two letters, written on the occasion of the centennial of the Emancipation Proclamation, that exhort Americans to attack the terrible legacy of racism.






Gorman, Amanda. *The Hill We Climb.* Viking Books, 2021. Along with a foreword by Oprah Winfrey, read the poem presented by Gorman at President Biden's inauguration.



Shabazz, Ilyasah & Jackson, Tiffany. *The Awakening of Malcolm X*. Farrar, Straus and Giroux, 2021. A fictional memoir by Malcolm X's daughter recounting Malcolm Little's formative years in prison and the harsh realities of systemic racism he faced.





Villasante, Alexandra. *The Grief Keeper.* G.P.Putnam's Sons, 2019. Seventeen-year-old Marisol and her younger sister flee their home in El Salvador and Marisol agrees to become involved in a risky, experimental study in the United States to keep her sister safe.

Watson, Renee & Hagan, Ellen. *Watch Us Rise.* Bloomsbury, 2019. Best friends Jasmine and Chelsea are on a mission to improve the way women are treated, posting poems, essays, and videos online that go viral.





Whitehead, Colson. *The Nickel Boys.* Doubleday, 2019. Based on the real story of a reform school in Tallahassee, this novel follows young Elwood Curtis who is growing up at the Nickel Academy in the 1960s.




